elcome to taekwondo at Rio 2016!
Rio is famed for its carnivals, and taekwondo
will rock the city with a "festival of fight" - lively ring
announcements, thunderous music, gravity-defying
demonstrations by the WTF Demonstration Team and
the world's top taekwondo stars competing for glory.

I hope you note the sport's innovations. For over a decade, we have leveraged technology to make taekwondo as fair and transparent as possible – we have even been dubbed "techwondo!" London saw the first Olympic use of a PSS (Protector and Scoring System) trunk protector, in which sensors electronically register points; Rio marks the Olympic debut of the Head PSS. We have also tweaked scoring to encourage the most spectacular kicks, and made our mats octagonal to promote lively movement.

I hope you recognize our focus on **equality**. Taekwondo is a true **sport for all**, one of the most economical and democratic sports on earth. In Rio, our team of international referees is split exactly 50-50, male-female. And while para-taekwondo athletes are not competing in Rio, they will make their Paralympic debuts in Tokyo 2020.

I hope you take an interest in a new initiative: The **Taekwondo Humanitarian Foundation (THF)**.

Taekwondo requires minimal equipment, so is one of the easiest sports to deploy. It delivers physical fitness, mental discipline, self-defence and self-respect. Since late 2015, the **THF has been teaching taekwondo** to some of those who need its benefits the most: Refugees and displaced persons. THF programs are underway in Syrian **refugee camps** in Jordan and Turkey, and in earthquake-struck regions of Nepal.

I hope you approach me with questions, queries or comments. Myself and the WTF Council will be at the venue, and we want to hear what media professionals make of Olympic taekwondo.

And I hope you talk to our athletes. Taekwondo boasts over 70 million practitioners, making it one of the globe's top participation sports. When you meet our elite players here in Rio, you will find they are some of the most open, friendly and courteous sportspeople anywhere. I conclude with one request: In your coverage of taekwondo in Rio, please do our athletes justice!

For some 2000 years, a range of martial arts were practiced on the Korean peninsula. However, the martial arts that would form what we now call "taekwondo" first appeared in Korea after the Japanese colonial period (1910-1945) ended. Following the Korean War (1950-1953), a number of these martial arts styles and schools agreed to cooperate and use the name "taekwondo" (literally: "The way of fist and foot") to describe what they did in 1959. In 1965, the name taekwondo was officially adopted.

Defining Taekwondo

Judo and taekwondo are both modern, unarmed martial arts, but while judo is based on grappling, taekwondo is based on striking. What differentiates taekwondo from its cousins, wushu and karate, is its emphasis on high kicking. For reasons that may be linked to physiology - Koreans inhabit a mountainous peninsula, and have the cultural habit of sitting on the floor, granting them legs that are both strong and flexible— and/or may be linked to national character – the Korean spirit is emotive and passionate – taekwondo emphasizes spectacular leg moves. Today's taekwondo provides its practitioners with a physical encyclopedia of high, spinning and jumping kicks that challenge the boundaries of athletic endeavor.



From Combat Sport to Olympic Sport

Taekwondo's first appearance at the Summer Olympic Games was in Seoul, in 1988, as a demonstration event. It appeared, again as a demonstration sport, at the Barcelona Summer Games in 1992. There were no demonstration sports at Atlanta in 1996, but taekwondo reappeared as a full medal sport at Sydney in 2000, then at Athens in 2004, at Beijing in 2008 and at London in 2012. Rio 2016 marks taekwondo's fifth consecutive appearance on the Olympic program as a full medal sport.



Competitive Formats

Two competitive formats exist for taekwondo: Poomsae, or solo patterns of taekwondo movements; and kyorugi, or sparring. Only kyorugi is an Olympic event. Kyorugi offers a plethora of national, regional and global championships, from Cadets and Juniors to Opens and Worlds. An invitational Grand Prix series was instituted in 2013 to create a regular circuit for the sport's elite athletes, to incubate stars and to upgrade the sport's media exposure.

From Korean Martial Art to Global Combat Sport

Going Global

While a small number of itinerant Korean masters travelled the world teaching the martial art from the mid-1950s onwards, taekwondo went global during the Vietnam War, when it was taught to Korean and South Vietnamese troops for physical conditioning and combat training. Many U.S. troops stationed in Vietnam and Korea also learned taekwondo, then taught it when they returned to the U.S., joining a growing number of Korean masters. In the 1970s, taekwondo received a huge boost from the world-wide martial arts movie boom.

From Martial Art to Combat Sport

With the advent of protective gear, the martial art morphed into a combat sport. Under the auspices of the Korea Taekwondo Association, the first world championships were held in Seoul in 1973, with 161 athletes from 16 nations competing. The World Taekwondo Federation, or WTF, was founded in Seoul in 1973 as the international governing body, replacing an earlier body, the International Taekwondo Federation. Under the auspices of the WTF, taekwondo evolved in all aspects, from its competitive systems to its technical repertoire. It also saw a massive expansion in its geographical reach, its number of practitioners and its range of championships.

A Global Sport

While the sport was customarily dominated by Koreans, this is no longer the case: In London 2012, only one gold medal went to Korea. Taekwondo is now a truly global sport with one of the widest medal distributions in the Olympic Games: In London, the eight gold medals on offer went to eight different nations. As it requires no real equipment other than the human body, it is an economical and democratic sport, offering developing nations some of their best opportunities for Olympic success. An estimated 70 million people practice WTF taekwondo, making it one of the world's most popular participant sports.

A Global Organization

Today, the WTF has two headquarters: One in Seoul, Korea, and another in Lausanne, Switzerland. The current WTF president is Chungwon Choue (Korea) and the current WTF secretary general is Hoss Rafaty (USA). Taekwondo is practiced in 206 countries and territories worldwide, administered by five Continental Unions (Africa, Asia, Europe, Pan America and Oceania).

A Sport for

ALL

Taekwondo is not only a global sport, it is a "sport for all" that leaves no athlete behind. Para-taekwondo is rising in popularity. Five World Para-Taekwondo Championships have been contested since 2009, and para-taekwondo makes its Paralympic debut in Tokyo in 2020. WTF President Choue is also president of the Taekwondo Humanitarian Foundation, or THF, which was established in April 2016 and operates out of the WTF's Lausanne office. The THF leverages taekwondo's deployability to empower refugees and displaced persons by teaching them the sport and martial art. Programs for Syrian refugees in Jordan and Turkey, and for earthquake victims in Nepal, are underway.

A Sport with

EVERYTHING

Taekwondo is not just for the athletic elite. It provides a near-perfect exercise system, inculcating flexibility, agility, grace, power, speed and stamina. And as a combat sport, its practice fosters courage. For these reasons, it is practiced by people of all ages, colors and creeds: As an anti-aging remedy for the old, as recuperation for the injured and as an education in physical and mental discipline for children.

A Sport with **VALUES**

While taekwondo is a combat sport, it retains many of the practices of a martial art. These include its code of conduct, exemplified in the "Tenets of Taekwondo:" courtesy, integrity, perseverance, self-control and indomitable spirit. These tenets are fully in synch with Olympic values. Former IOC President Juan Antonio Samaranch noted: "We find [in taekwondo] principles which come close to, one might almost say merge with, those advocated by Baron de Coubertin." Before and after fighting, taekwondo athletes bow to one another. Taekwondo, it is said, begins and ends with courtesy.



How to Play the Game

How to Score

Taekwondo is a kick-punch sport, with a specialization in kicks. High and turning/spinning kicks are awarded with higher points. Most points are scored via impact with the electronic sensors embedded in the protective head and trunk armour, known as the Protector and Scoring System, or PSS. Punches to the trunk are scored by corner judges with hand-held scoring devices. "Technical points" – that is, additional points for spinning kicks – are awarded by corner judges with hand-held scoring devices. Kicks to the face – which is not covered by the open-faced head PSS – are also awarded by corner judges with hand-held scoring devices.

Point awards

Points are scored by:

Kicks to the trunk PSS, head PSS and face. Punches to the trunk PSS.





The aim of taekwondo is for the athlete to kick and punch the opponent, while avoiding being kicked and punched.

- Matches are fought on a matted, octagonal field of play, which encourages lively footwork, evasive movement and demands good use of peripheral vision.
- Matches consist of three rounds of two minutes each, with one-minute breaks between rounds.

■ Gold and silver medals are won in the final match.

Two bronze medals are won via repechage.





Spinning kick to the head/face

How to Win, How to Lose



Athletes win by:

Amassing more points than their opponent.

Amassing a 12-point difference, after which the match is automatically halted at the end of the second round, or at any time during the third round.



Accumulating fewer points than their

Being 12 points behind their opponent.

Being unable to continue due to injury or stoppage by referee.

Amassing five full penalty points.





Overtime, 'Golden Point' and Superiority

If two athletes have equal points at the end of the third round, the match goes to "golden point" – ie whoever scores the first point wins the match.

The "golden point" round lasts for a maximum of two minutes.

If no point is scored by either fighter within two minutes, the match is decided on superiority (ie whoever has amassed the most hits on the PSS).

Fouls and Penalties

26 26 2 S

Apart from punches to the trunk and kicks to trunk, head and face, all other combative techniques (throws, foot sweeps, knee strikes, elbow strikes, gouges, head butts, etc) are disallowed. Penalties are divided into kyong-go (warning/half-point penalty) and gam-jeom (full-point deduction). Two kyong-go result in one gam-jeom. Any athlete who amasses five penalty points automatically loses.

Crossing the Boundary Line

Falling down

Avoiding or delaying the match

Grabbing, holding or pushing the opponent

Lifting the knee to block or/and impede the opponent's kicking attack

Kicking below the waist

Misconduct of contestant or coach



The same fouls as above – if they are more excessive or repeated.

Referees and Corner Judges

The referee controls the match. The role of the three corner judges is to score "technical points," punches and face kicks with hand-held scoring devices. Two out of the three judges must signal the points within one second for the points to be awarded.



Each coach is permitted to appeal for one video replay per competition. The coach signals his/her appeal to the referee by card. If the coach's appeal is successful, he/she is allowed to keep the card and reuse it. If the appeal is unsuccessful, the coach loses the card for the

peal is unsuccessful, the coach loses the card for the remainder of the competition.

For medal matches, each coach has his/her video replay quota of one card restored, regardless of how many times his/her card was used in the preliminary matches.

As the head PSS does not cover the face, but kicks to the face are permitted techniques, coaches often call video replays for kicks that contacted (or appeared to contact) the face.

A video replay jurist reviews the appeal and decides on whether to award the point(s) or not. The video replay is shown to the audience on the overhead screens.

Inside the

aekwondo's Protector and Scoring System, or PSS, was first adopted for Olympic competition at the London Summer Olympics in 2012.

Essentially, the PSS is a system of electronic impact sensors built into the protective gear of the taekwondo athlete – the socks, the trunk protector and the head protector – which is wirelessly linked to the electronic scoreboard. When impact is made with the correct part of the foot to the opponent's head or torso, points flash up on the scoreboard automatically.

The advent of the PSS was hailed as a major step forward for the transparency and fairness of taekwondo competition. In terms of transparency, it gives the audience an immediate view of who is scoring. In terms of fairness, it obviates human error: Previously, taekwondo had relied upon judges to score techniques.

However, the three corner judges, using hand-held scoring devices, still score punches to the trunk and add "technical points" scored by turning/spinning kicks (which earn extra points, compared to basic kicks). The open-faced head protector does not cover the front of the face, which is a legitimate target, so face kicks are also scored by judges. If the point is not registered by the judges, the coach can call for a video replay, which is decided upon by the video replay jury.

The PSS is in a constant process of technical evolution. Rio 2016 will feature the first use of head PSS in Olympic competition; in London, only the socks and trunk protector were used. Naturally, the technology has been widely tested and proven in global competition prior to its adoption for Rio 2016.



Rio will be the first Olympic competition to include PSS in the head protector. Kicks to the head do not need to be as powerful, in terms of impact, as kicks to the trunk to register on the PSS. Prior to matches beginning, athletes hold out their head gear for their opponent to lightly kick to ensure that the sensors are working correctly.

Trunk PSS

PSS was included in the trunk protector for the first time in London. There are no significant changes to this technology in Rio.

Sensing Socks


At Rio in 2016, there will be 11 proximity sensors on each sock – an upgrade from seven in London in 2012. The four new sensors are on the heel, the top/center of the toes, the side of the big toe and the inner ankle. This will ensure that kicks of different types of techniques will score.

What's New in

Taekwondo is in a constant process of evolution and innovation as the WTF seeks to make the sport ever more fair, transparent, athlete-centric and enjoyable for spectators. In the four years since London 2012, a number of changes have been made in areas ranging from point adjustments and technological upgrades to referee composition and field of play shape. The major changes are as follows:



General

First Olympic Taekwondo Appearances

Seven countries will compete in Olympic taekwondo for the very first time at Rio 2016. These countries are Aruba, Belarus, Cape Verde, DR. Congo, Moldova, Mongolia and Tonga.

Fifth Olympic Taekwondo Appearance

Steven Lopez (USA) is the first taekwondo athlete ever to qualify for five Olympic Games.

100 Percent Seeding for Athletes

Athletes will be seeded based on the WTF Olympic rankings of July 1, 2016. The final 128 to athletes to compete in Rio will be seeded after the closing of entry on July 18. Host country athletes shall receive no. 4 seeds. In London, only the top eight athletes in each 16-person weight category were seeded.

The Game

Head PSS

In Rio, both the head guard and trunk protector feature PSS (Protector and Scoring System – i.e. electronic impact sensors built into the protective gear) for optimal transparency and fairness. In London, only the trunk protector and sensing socks, featured PSS.

3 Points for Spinning Kick to Body

In London two points were awarded, but in Rio, this has been upgraded to three to encourage use of the spectacular spinning back kick, spinning roundhouse kick and spinning heel kick.

Octagonal Mat

In Rio, octagonal mats, which promote livelier footwork, more movement and demand peripheral vision, replace the rectangular mats used in London.

Increased Penalty Points

In London, when it came to penalties, if an athlete received four full penalty points

(eight kyong-go, or warnings/half-point penalities, and/ or four gam-jeoms, or full-point penalties) in a match, he or she was disqualified. In Rio, this has been extended to five penalty points (ten kyong-go and/or five gamjeom). This change has been made to encourage players to engage more closely.





Game Management

Equal Gender Ratio for Referees

In Rio, 15 male and 15 female referees – a 50-50 gender split - will be fielded for the first time as part of the WTF's commitment to gender equality.

Yellow Card

In Rio, for the first time, referees will have a yellow card to sanction coaches who display un-sportsmanlike behavior. If a coach gets a yellow card, his or her athlete also receives a kyung-go (warning).

Corner Judges Outside Podium

In Rio, the three corner judges will sit outside the podium, removing visual clutter and creating a clearer field of play. In London, they were in the podium.

Wireless Communication Between Referee and Review Jury

In Rio, for the first time, there will be wireless communications between the referee and the review jury to save time during the review process. The public announcer will also be wired it, so he can inform the crowd what is going on.

Lightweight Tracking Camera

In a Rio first, this technology will provide TV viewers with better-than-ever views of the action.

Real Time Display Signal at Athlete Calling and Warm-up Area

For the first time in Rio, athletes will be able to see the progress of action in the arena from their calling and warm-up areas.

Using Radio Frequency for PSS Signal

In London, a wifi system was used, which can be subject to interference. A radio frequency, to be introduced in Rio, is more reliable.

Options for Coaches to Wear Suits

Coaches will be able to wear either suits or NOC outfits.

Athlete Presentation

Colored Pants

Athletes can choose to wear colored uniform pants, or pants in the style of their national flag, if they wish. In London, traditional, plain white pants were worn.

Bib Numbers Means Something

In Rio for the first time, the athletes' bibs will include information on their weight division and their seeding position, giving the audience more information at a glance. (Weight division 1= W-49kg / 2=M-58kg / 3= W-57kg / 4= M -68kg / 5= W-67kg / 6= M-80kg / 7= W+67kg /8= +80kg. Seeding = 1 through 16)

Intro Music Chosen by Athletes

In Rio, for the first time, the intro music that plays when the athletes march onto the field of play will be chosen by the athletes themselves

Taekwondo Demonstrations Expanded

In London, displays by the WTF Demonstration Team took place in the gaps between the day's three sessions. In Rio, these popular demonstrations will also take place in gaps between matches.

Match Tree Displayed on Jumbo Screen

In Rio for the first time, spectators will be kept constantly in the know on the progress of athletes, thanks to the match tree display on the venue's big screen.







Qualification Process

From August 17-20, 2016, 128 taekwondo fighters, fighting in eight weight categories – four male (-58kg, -68kg, -80kg, +80kg) and four female (-49kg, -57kg, -67kg, +67kg) – do battle for Olympic medals at Carioca Arena 3, a purpose-built, combat sport-specialized arena in Rio's Barra Olympic Park. This is how the athletes qualified.

The first tranche of 48 elite athletes won Rio quota places for their National Olympic Committees via ranking points accumulated after the Grand Prix Finals, held in Mexico City, in December 2015. Each NOC could qualify a maximum of one athlete per weight category. However, the athletes who won their NOCs the berths were not guaranteed places: The final decision on who actually filled the slots was made by national selectors.

Those NOCs which qualified fewer than two male and two female athletes via ranking points were eligible for the second tranche of Rio berths, fought for at the Continental Qualification Tournaments. These five tournaments offered 72 Rio slots in the first half of 2016. Each NOC was able to qualify a maximum of two male and two female athletes (with a maximum of one fighter per weight category). The continental quotas broke down to: 16 athletes each from Africa, Asia, Europe and Pan-America; and eight from Oceania.

Brazil benefited from a quota of four host country places: two male (-58kg and +80kg) and two female (-49kg and -57kg).

Finally Tripartite Commission Invitations - better known as "wild cards" - offered a further four fighters the chance of Olympic glory in those categories not chosen by Brazil (ie male -68kg and -80kg, and female -67kg and +67kg).

The seeded athletes in each taekwondo weight division were announced on July 18, 2016, on the WTF website.



About Repechage

Each of Olympic taekwondo's eight weight categories consists of a single elimination tournament. The winner of the final receives the gold medal and the loser of the final receives the silver medal. Two bronze medals are awarded via repechage.

The repechage is conducted among all contestants who lost to the two finalists in the elimination phase. In the repechage, the losers of the semifinals during the elimination phase are seeded directly to each of the repechage finals, but on the opposite sides of the bracket. Other losers will advance to the repechage unseeded, at the same side of the bracket in which they contested during the elimination phase.



Making History: Can Wu Win Olympic Gold #3?

At Rio, all eyes will be on China's Jingyu"Joy" Wu (W-49kg) A double Olympic gold medalist in Beijing and London, the burning question is: "Can she make it three in a row?" If she does, she would write history as the first taekwondo athlete in either male or female divisions to pull it off. Wu, voted the WTF's "2015 Female Player of the Year" by her peers, is a popular character as well as a brilliant fighter, and dominated her division in the 2015 Grand Prix series.

Olympic Gold: From Fiction to Fact

Speaking of Wu: Her first encounter with Olympic gold was fictional rather than factual: The then-unknown taekwondo athlete had a bit part, playing the heroine as a child, in the 2003 film "Taekwondo," about a Chinese athlete who wins Olympic gold. Fast forward to Beijing 2008, and Wu had a real Olympic gold medal around her neck.

Making History: Lopez Attends Fifth Olympic Taekwondo Competition

Team U.S.A.'s Steven Lopez (M-80kg) is the first taekwondo athlete ever to fight in five Olympic competitions. A triple Olympic medalist, Lopez, who is coached by his brother Jean, seized golds in Sydney and Athens, and won bronze in Beijing. Lopez did not quality for Rio via ranking points, but won a place in the Pan Am Continental Qualification event. Taekwondo has changed since Lopez's heyday, and he will be fighting young guns ten years his junior in Rio - but his vast experience, awesome reputation and fighting spirit could yet net him one more Olympic medal to add to his collection.

Taekwondo: It's a Family Affair#1

Sisters Caroline and Carmen Marton, together with Carmen's husband Safwan Khalil, all won Olympic places for Australia. Caroline Marton won a berth in the women's -57kg category, Carmen Marton captured a spot in the women's -67kg division, while the latter's spouse, Safwan Khalil, won a place in the men's -58kg category. All three are coached by Ali Khalil, Safwan's brother - who presumably keeps family disputes in order...

Taekwondo: It's a Family Affair #2

Papua New Guinea's Samantha Kassman won a place in the women's -67kg category at the Oceania Continental Qualification Tournament, while on the same mats, her nephew Maxemillion Kassman captured a berth in the men's +80kg division.

Jackie Chan or Power Rangers?

Uzbekistan's Dmitriy Shokin (M+80kg) and Turkey's Servet Tazegul (M-80kg) both credit Hong Kong movie star Jackie Chan's movies with getting them interested in martial arts. Moldova's Aaron Cook (M-80kg) preferred the "Mighty Morphin' Power Rangers."

From Bullying Victim to **Heavyweight Champion**

Speaking of Shokin: The Uzbek heavyweight is one of the most formidable presences in the game, combining a Homeric physique with an array of fighting techniques. Remarkably enough, he learned taekwondo as a child to fend off bullies. We don't' see anyone bullying him now....

The (Nick) Name of the Game

As is the case in other sports, many taekwondo athletes are known by their nicknames – some chosen by the players, others chosen by team mates, fans, pundits and journalists. They



Stars To Watch

Dong-min Cha



South Korea, M+80kg **Gold Medalist, Beijing 2008**

Cha is one of the smallest players in the category and is known for his attacking style, his left front kick and his right-leg spinning back kick - a technique that both racks up points and intimidates opponents. Though calm and highly experienced, he is one of the smallest and oldest competitors in the game and will be under threat from bigger, younger guns, especially the number one seeded heavyweight, Uzbekistan's Dmitriy "Shock Force" Shokin. Rio will be not just be Cha's last Olympics, but also his last taekwondo Competition - meaning this veteran competitor will gave it his all.

Aaron Cook



Moldova, M-80kg
'WTF Best Kick of the Year' 2015

Cook is one of taekwondo's most exciting fighters, noted for his all-out attacks and his wicked spinning kicks. British by birth, he was at the center of controversy when, despite being wildly popular with British fans and holding world No. 1 ranking, he was not selected to represent Team GB in London in 2012. (British selectors chose, instead, eventual bronze medalist Lutalo Muhammad). That snub spurred Cook to change his allegiance to Moldova, under whose flag he will fight in Rio. Whenever Cook fights the crowd comes to its feet - but if he fights Muhammad, there will be added drama.

Maria Espinoza



Mexico, W+67kg

Gold Medalist, Beijing 2008

After winning gold in Beijing, Espinoza took bronze in London in 2012, making her probably the most famed taekwondo player in Mexico, where the sport has a huge following. A fierce and intense-looking competitor, Espinoza is one of the most combative of taekwondo's female fighters, feared for her spinning back kick and her powerful punch. The latter is one of the best in the game, and has led to her being dubbed "Fist of Fury." In Rio, she will face a steep challenge on the mats against players with a significant height advantage, forcing her to leverage her footwork to the max.

Joel Gonzalez Bonilla



Spain, M-68kg **Gold Medalist, London 2012**

Gonzalez has the ultimate physique for taekwondo: Tall and long-legged. He has a basic-but-smart style – step-by-step, point-by-point – but is also noted for his crowd-pleasing and point-scoring straight leg kicks to the face. However, he is fighting in one of the toughest divisions in the sport, crowded with stars such as Russia's Alexi Denisenko and Turkey's Servet Tazegul, and could be drawn against his all-time rival, Korea's Dae-hoon Lee - whose nose he once broke with that wicked high kick.

Jade Jones



Great Britain, W-57kg
Gold Medalist, London 2012;
'WTF Female Player of the
Year' 2014

The Welsh girl became a national heroine after winning gold in London in 2012, and was subsequently honored by Queen Elizabeth II for services to taekwondo. She has had an impressive fighting season in 2015, peaking near the end of year with two dominant wins in the elite Grand Prix series over her arch-rival, Spain's Eva Calvo Gomez. Known as "The Headhunter" for the accuracy of her front-leg round kick – aided by the eagle eye of Coach Paul Green, whose success when calling video replies is unerring - Jones is the favorite to win a second Olympic gold in her category in Rio.


Dae-hoon Lee



South Korea, M-68kg
'WTF Male Player of the Year'
2014, 2015

The soft-spoken Korean fighter is wildly popular among his peers: He was voted "Man of the Year" twice consecutively, in 2014 and 2015. An ambidextrous fighter with significant experience and a full arsenal of varied turning kicks and spin heel kicks, he is a calm player who likens himself to a turtle! His number-one fan (and first taekwondo coach) will be on the edge of his seat in front of the TV when Lee does battle in Rio: His father.

Steven Lopez



USA, M-80kg

Gold Medalist, Sydney 2000 and Athens 2004. 5th straight Olympic appearance

Lopez is a legend. The most famous fighter the sport has ever produced, he is a winner of two Olympic gold medals and one bronze, as well as being a five-time world champion. His siblings Mark and Diana have also been taekwondo Olympians and his coach is older brother Jean. But now, the legend is in his career twilight: Born in 1978, Lopez is the oldest competitor on the Rio mats and the game has changed since his heyday. However, his technique, experience and fighting spirit are undeniable, and few if any athletes can equal this warrior's capacity for performing to the max at the most critical moment.

Milica Mandic



Serbia, W+67kg

Gold Medalist, London 2012

One of the sport's friendliest, most popular players, the Serbian became a national heroine when she won gold in London in 2012. As she proceeded through the preliminaries, countless Serbians went online to research taekwondo rules and techniques. Fighting through a string of injuries, Mandic recovered late in the grueling 2015 "Road to Rio" fighting season. Technically proficient at the front-leg high kick and the punch, she is, however, not as tall or leggy as some of the other fighters in her category, which also features some highly experienced players.

Servet Tazegul



Turkey, M-68kg

Gold Medalist, London 2012

Tazegul vies with Aaron Cook as the taekwondo fighter the crowd loves to watch the most. Known as "The Cheetah" for his killer moves and spectacular aerial techniques, he delighted taekwondo fans when he returned from a slump to seize World Championship gold in 2015. His final fight against Russia's Alexey Denisenko in that tournament was one of the all-time great taekwondo clashes – a high-scoring, high-velocity battle of flying feet - which could be re-fought in Rio. But regardless of the opponent, "The Cheetah" has one gear forward - and one speed - all out.

Jingyu Wu



China, W-49kg

Gold Medalist Beijing 2008 and

London 2012; 'WTF Female Player of the Year' 2015

In an extraordinary coincidence, the then-unknown Chinese athlete played a bit-role in the Chinese movie "Taekwondo" (2003) about a taekwondo player who wins Olympic gold. In 2008, fact followed fiction when Wu won gold in Beijing - a feat she repeated in London in 2012. A cool-headed master of footwork, tactics and game management, she dominated her category in 2015, making her a favorite for yet another gold in Rio. If she delivers, she will make Olympic history as the first taekwondo athlete to win three consecutive golds. When not training, Wu spends time working with disadvantaged children, and is popular with her peers: She was voted "WTF Female Player of the Year" in 2015. And on the sidelines of the competition, Wu is sure to exhibit the spirit which her Chinese name, Jingyu, translates to: "Joy."
